RENEE DABNEY wills Mrs. Post an automatic filing system so that in the future she will be able to locate her "rabbit food."

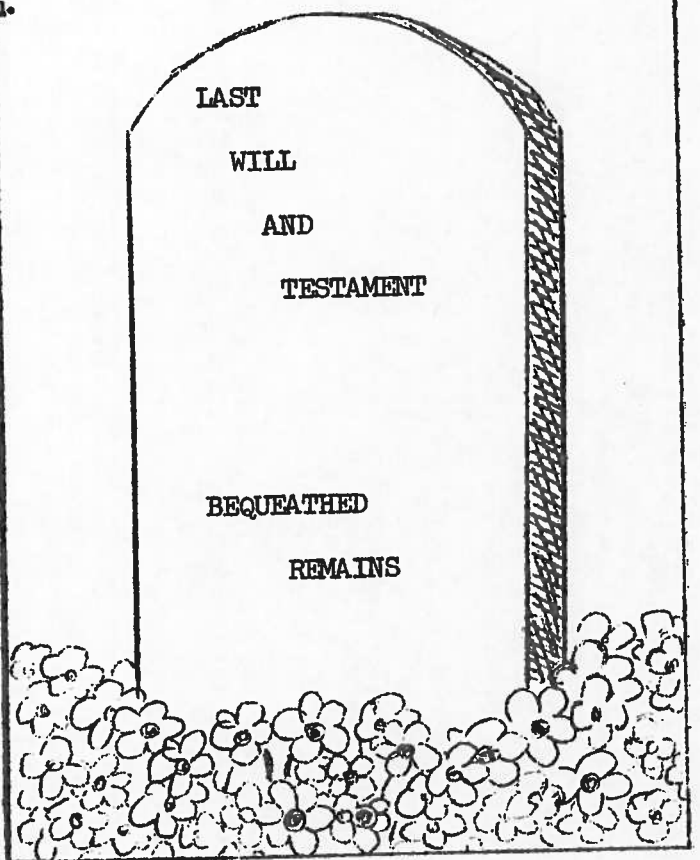
JAN DARNELL leaves Mr. Scrimenti and his excellent teaching skills to the juniors. Best of luck!

MICHAEL GILEVSKI will always treasure the track suit that he stole.

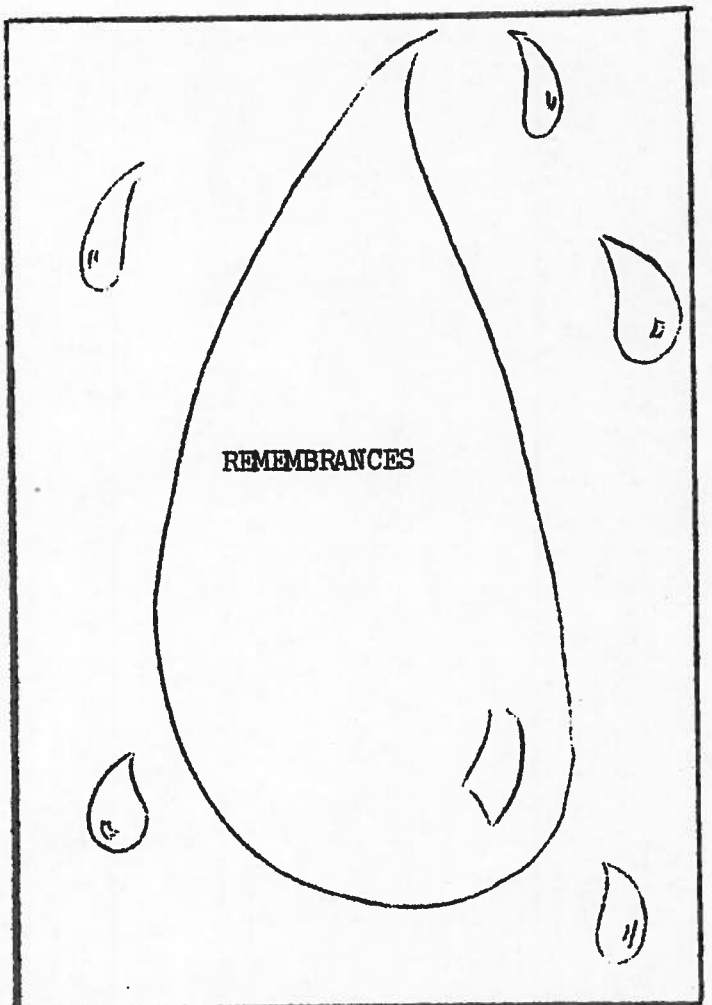

DIANE MURPHY will be out on a limb, working as a lineman for the telephone company.

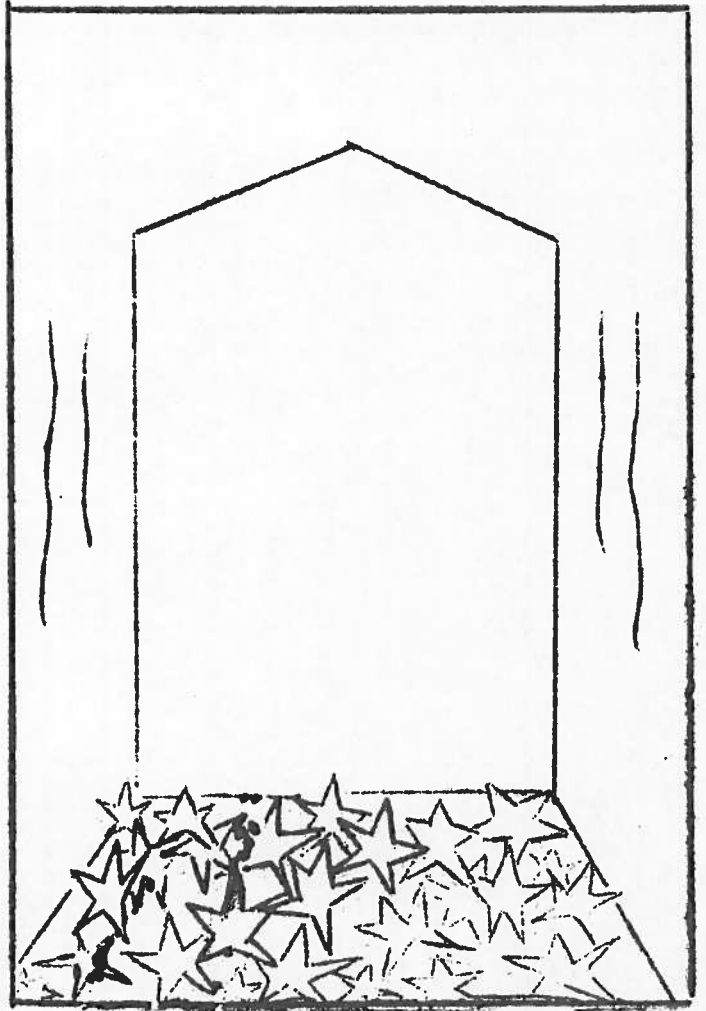
Playing in the rice paddies in Viet Nam was DOUG NESSELHAUF's prediction.
